Services

In an effort to keep you informed as to where your contributions are going, the agencies that will receive funding for the 1987-88 Allocation year are listed below. These Allocations are utilizing the dollars raised this past year. As the United Way strives to make your donations work harder in our community, some agencies are designated to receive "Programmatic Funding". This means that these agencies can only use the United Way dollars for specific programs or purposes. (These agencies are marked with a ** and the "Programmatic Funding" restrictions are detailed for you.)

AMERICAN RED CROSS - North Country Chapter: \$7,850

Offering disaster relief, health and safety services, a free blood program, services to military families and volunteer programs.

ANDROSCOGGIN VALLEY HOME CARE SERVICES: \$7,800

Provides Homemaker/Home Health Aide services for the elderly, mentally ill, developmentally disabled and the physically handicapped on a long term or short term basis. Services include light housekeeping, personal care, shopping, medication checks, emotional support and other assistance as needed to prevent or reduce inappropriate institutional care.

****ANDROSCOGGIN VALLEY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES - OUTPATIENT SERVICES: \$2,500**

Providing outpatient services including counseling, emergency services, partial hospitalization, inpatient service, and case management. United Way funding designated for outpatient services.

ASSISTING WOMEN IN TRANSITION PROGRAM: \$5,000

A free to the public program, Assisting Women in Transition Program was placed in serious jeopardy as the result of Federal Budget cuts in Administrative funding. The program was granted an allocation to enable the agency to apply for matching federal funds to support the salary of the Executive Director. This agency's mission is to assist North Country low/middle income single parents, misplaced homemakers and homemakers make the transition into education, training for the workforce and

ultimately to become financially self-sufficient, contributing members of our community.

BOYSCOUTS OF AMERICA - DANIEL WEBSTER COUNCIL: \$2,500

A program emphasizing character development, citizenship training, mental and physical fitness.

****COMMUNITY ACTION-FOOD PANTRY & SOUP KITCHEN: \$3,500**

Finding jobs, providing crisis assistance, helping low income people move into and stay in the mainstream of society. United Way funding designated for the Food Pantry and Soup Kitchen Programs.

****COOS COUNTY FAMILY HEALTH SERVICES - RESPONSE**

Meeting the social, emotional, nutritional, and medical needs of more than 2,500 women, infants and children through four separate but related programs. United Way funding is designated primarily to help sustain the RESPONSE program and for pre-natal care in our communities.

COOS COUNTY RETIRED SENIOR VOLUNTEER PROGRAM: \$5,000

Recruits seniors for volunteer positions in over 40 agencies in Coos County contributing to 40,000 volunteer hours in our communities. An RSVP volunteer may provide telephone reassurance, friendly visiting, grandmothers for children at a local day care or assistance to one of the United Way member agencies.

GOLDEN AGE CLUB: \$200

Organizes leisure activities, bus trips and other social events for active retired senior citizens.

HOLIDAY CENTER: \$7,000

Multipurpose center offering older citizens a place to meet with their peer group while being involved in workshops, exercise programs, classes, sharing meals and reading and writing for the blind. An Adult Day Care Center.

NEW HAMPSHIRE LEGAL ASSISTANCE: \$8,000

Providing legal advice, referral, and representation for low-income and elderly in non-criminal cases. Aiding in problems concerning housing, health, employment, family, education, consumer rights and income maintenance.

NORTHCOUNTRY SENIOR WHEELS: \$5,000

Providing transportation to the elderly and handicapped citizens of Coos County on a demand responsive basis. Transportation priorities are medical (with weekly medical trips to Hanover), nutritional and social/recreational.

NORTH COUNTRY UPWARD BOUND: \$3,000

Assists low and middle income high school students attain a post-secondary education by providing tutoring, motivational, educational and financial aid counseling.

NORTHERN NH COUNCIL ON ALCOHOLISM - DERBY'S LODGE: \$9,500

A comprehensive community-based approach to the problem and prevention of alcohol-drug abuse through education and outpatient counseling on alcohol and drug abuse. Derby's Lodge is a post-detoxification residential program for those 18 and older.

**** SALVATION ARMY: \$4,155**

Providing emergency services in times of disaster. Gifts and food are provided to needy families at Thanksgiving and Christmas. United Way funding designated in the amounts as stated: \$3,655.00 designated for the two week summer camping experience for 20 area children at the Salvation Army Camp Sebago in Sebago, Maine. United Way funding to pay all costs incurred. Registration fee charged, if any, to be returned to camper for use at the Salvation Army Camp Store. The remaining balance of \$500 is designated for emergency lodging. A voucher system will be utilized with bills to be submitted to the United Way for payment of services as rendered.

GIRL SCOUTS OF AMERICA SWIFT WATER COUNCIL: \$2,100

Helping girls from 6 to 17 reach their full potential as girls, as women, as citizens — a program emphasizing individual values and self-worth.

WHITE MOUNTAIN DAY CARE CENTER: \$12,014

Providing quality child care for working families of all income levels. For ages 2 to 8 years, children are given loving child care in a safe and pleasant environment. Transportation to and from area schools for kindergarten is also offered for a small fee.
